NOTED AUTHOR, JOHN ROUSMANIERE TO SPEAK AT ANNUAL MEETING, APRIL 17

"Looking for the One Shot" - Sleek Yachts and their Photographers

Sailor-writer-historian John Rousmaniere will present an enthralling illustrated talk about the golden age of yachting, when brave photographers went out in small boats to try to snap the all-important, perfect "one shot" of a huge schooner racing by, throwing torrents of spray.

Based on Rousmaniere's new book Sleek: Classic Sailboat Photography from the Rosenfeld Collection, and illustrated by photographs (in some cases previously unseen) from Mystic Seaport, the talk will describe great yachts, their designers, and the photographers who struggled with ungainly cameras, often risking their lives to get the right shot. One of these pioneers, a former combat photographer, once observed that when the wind is up, "the pictures have life in them, and there is an excitement and element of danger present that appeals to everyone who has good, red blood in his veins."

The yachts shown here possess qualities of grace, power, purposefulness, and sleekness - all captured by some of America's finest photographers. "What motivated us was always the best thing we could see," said one of them, Stanley Rosenfeld. These pictures portray some of the best things that anybody has ever seen and photographed.

Of our speaker, author Jonathan Raban has said, "Among writers who sail and sailors who write, John Rousmaniere is unrivaled in his technical expertise, his breadth of thought and feeling, and in his vigor and lucidity as a storyteller." His 20 books include Fastnet, Force 10

and After the Storm, hailed by Nathaniel Philbrick, author of In the Heart of the Sea, as


"Vivid, wise, and heartfelt, the crowning achievement of one of America's foremost sailing writers." John's Annapolis Book of Seamanship is America's standard sailing manual. He has written histories of the America's Cup and yachting, including a book about the Fishers Island Yacht Club that Mystic Seaport will publish later in 2004.

Descended from a French soldier who fought in the American Revolution, John Rousmaniere lives in Stamford, Connecticut, and New York with his wife, mystery writer, Leah Ruth Robinson.

IN MEMORIAM

Two longtime members of the Bullseye Association passed away in recent months. John M. Corcoran, philanthropist and real estate developer, died October 22nd. He had been a paratrooper in World War II and was one of the first 15 Americans to land at Normandy Beach in the D-Day invasion. As a pathfinder, he was charged with lighting the fields for the massive air support drop behind enemy lines.

George S. Burr died on November 13th. He served in the Army Signal Corps during World War II. An avid sailor and skier he at one time was Vice-Commodore of the Beverly Yacht Club in Marion. He was co-founder of the Instron Corporation, which has 31 offices in 17 countries. A fellow member at Beverly describes him as "a gentle and courteous person with a warm interest in everyone."

FROM THE BUILDER:

It has come to our attention recently that there may have been a few modifications to Bullseye rudders. In the interest of fair competition, we would like to make the rule in the technical specifications clear:


No change in the dimensions, location, weight, shape or materials of the keel, rudder, or spars from such dimensions, location, weight, shape and materials that are standard for the Cape Cod Bullseye shall be permitted, except such changes which are incidental to the upkeep of such items.

We are presenting a standard rudder diagram with measurements in case a questionable rudder requires measuring. The trailing edge of the Bullseye rudder comes out of the mold blunt. Rudders that have had the trailing edge sharpened to a point do not conform with current class rules. Note, also, that building up the forward part of the rudder, or the back part of the deadwood is not permitted. You must have a gap between your deadwood and rudder of at least 1/4".

Are pointy rudders faster? Will you go faster if water is prevented from going in the gap between the deadwood and rudder? Perhaps they offer a slight advantage. However, our rules are in place to keep competition fair. We finish in the order we do, not because of modifications that have been made. It is our skill, time

in the boat and teamwork that get us ahead. Ultimately, this is a one-design class and it is up to all of us to make sure our boats remain that way.
