ANOTHER GOOD WIN!

October 2006

For the second time in three years Wendy Goodwin has won the Bullseye Nationals. Red All Over decisively trounced a competitive fleet, placing 2,2,4,1,1 in the five-race, no throw-out regatta at Southwest Harbor, Maine, September 9 and 10, 2006.

Not that all the glory went to the Goodwin daughter-father team. Class President Joan Tiffany and husband Ed won the first race in <u>Cove Girl</u>. Reigning Nationals champions, Al and Lynne Mast, in <u>Sea Robin</u>, a borrowed boat, led the fleet of 22 in the second race. Alan Drew IV and his magician father Alan III won the third race using Magic.

Second place in the entire regatta went to the Drews (3,6,1,3,7). In third came the Fenner brothers, George and Pete (6,4,3,6,6) in <u>Owl</u>, a borrowed boat. Fourth were the Tiffanys (1,8,5,8,4) and fifth honors went to Michael Taylor

(5,11,11,2,3) with Danny Wriggins as crew in Aldebaran.

The racing took place on two, very different days. Saturday the sun finally pierced thick morning fog about noon. Crews waited nervously until about 11:15 when power boats commenced tugging strings of Bullseyes northward toward Somes Sound. The fog withered away as the omniscient Race Committee planted its hook just beyond Greening Island well before entering the long, narrow vault of Somes Sound.

This was a day of patchy, shifty, light breezes and fickle currents. Yet "foreign" boats <u>Cove Girl</u> and <u>Red All Over</u> prevailed, followed by locals <u>Magic, Gizmo</u>, (Pete Welles and Maggie Kelley) and <u>Aldebaran</u>. The race course was an unusual double triangle followed by windward leeward legs.

The Race Committee headed by the Homer brothers, Dick and Steve, opted for the same course for the second race. The weird conditions were also the same yet, except for the consistent Goodwins, another set of boats prevailed. This time the sparring was won by the Masts. Then came the Goodwins followed by Sean Beaulieu (age 10) skippering Pamina while his parents, Jean and Margaret, trimmed the sails. Fourth honors went to the steady Fenners (6,4,3,6,6) from Card Sound. Southwest Harbor's Tom and Ginny Rolfe finished 5th.

For the day's third and last race the Committee posted WLWLW but the only variation in the weather was that the windless patches were bigger. More than one boat sat helpless while boats less successful in the early going scooted by. The gates at the leeward end made life interesting and more fun. Choosing the less favored gate to avoid traffic proved fatal to several too cautious sailors. This was the Drews' race while Southwest Harbor's Englishman, Tony Smith, with Joe Peine aboard brought Isabel home in second. The Fenners came third followed by the slightly slipping Goodwins in 4th and the tenacious Tiffanys 5th.

Sunday was an entirely different day with bright blue sky and the chilly breath of a boisterous, oscillating nor'wester blowing a good 20 with puffs to 25. The two oldest boats in the fleet, Jody Smith's Lois T (64) and

Dave Burnham's Querida (80) came alive finishing 5 and 2, and 4 and 5 respectively in two races. For a long spell in one race they were 1st and 2nd. For these Sunday races in the outer harbor between Greening and Sutton Islands foul weather gear was the garb of the day. The Goodwins won both races, though not by leading the pack all the way. With devastating boat speed and dogged determination they passed boat after boat. Wendy, eyes glued to the telltales, and Gordon, calling the tacks, flew their spinnaker faultlessly when many skippers felt it too windy for the kite. Second place in the first race went to Michael Taylor, 3rd to the Drews, 4th to Dave and Paul Burnham, and 5th to Jody Smith and her crew of Liz Leduc, and Peter McDonald. In the second race Smith's Lois T secured a solid 2nd, followed by Aldebaran, Cove Girl, and Querida.

There were thoughts of a 3rd race by those hoping for a throwout but there was no time. The Race Committee wisely upped anchor and steamed to port. Boats from "away" had to be hauled while the tide was high. Actually, everyone was chilly and wet enough to be ready to trod sun-baked earth and savor the delicious barbecue awaiting all hands.

When the burgers were downed and the corn ears had become cobs, Jean Beaulieu stepped forth and announced the results.

Wendy Goodwin received for the third time the perpetual trophy named for her grandfather, E.L. Goodwin, maker of the fiberglass Bullseye. She easily earned the Peter Vincent Award for the non-local skipper who did the best in the Nationals. For the fourth time Dave Burnham won the Beverly Trophy for the skipper who had improved the most since the previous Nationals. The trick says Dave, who had just completed his 32nd consecutive Nationals, is to be alternately up and down.

THE COMING OF LOIS T

In the Nationals at Southwest Harbor she rose in the five races from 13th in the first to 2nd in the last, finishing 6th overall. 
