2007 BULLSEYE CLASS NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP — AUGUST 10-12, 2007

As the Beverly Yacht prepared to host skippers and crew for the 46th Bullseye Nationals, the 3 boats from "away" arrived at Burr Brothers Boatyard. It was misty and cool as the visitors donned rain gear and began to rig. Our bullseyes were lifted artfully into the water, and Gordon Goodwin towed us to moorings. We each received a gift tote and full instructions for the weekend, and were escorted to our host families where we quickly dressed for the casual dinner at the Goodwins.

Cape Cod Shipbuilding hosted an open bar and warmly welcomed us as the skies began to clear. Appetizers provided by BYC folks would have been enough but ribs and other morsels appeared followed by scrumptious cakes. We retired to our various abodes with the warm feeling one has after a reunion with friends.

Saturday began with light winds. A skippers meeting professionally conducted by PRO John Buckley set the tone for the day - race a good clean race and have fun. Off to the boats and with spinnakers set the sailors headed toward the race area. Spectator boats were filled and all were ready for the thrill of racing with our "Bullseye family." After a slow start four races were held. Race One found 5 boats unable to finish within the 30-minute time limit as the wind (what there was of it) died and slowly shifted from NE to ESE. Then the breeze of 5 went to 7 and off we went for Race Two. Race Three found the winds coming from the S at 9 to 10! Finishing boats gathered around the Committee Boat urging "just one more", as the winds settled SW at 12 to 15 with gusts to 17. Four races! Thank you, Buzzards Bay!

Saturday evening found us gathered at the BYC for an elegant dinner. We were warmly welcomed by Joan Tiffany and Susan Mead, intrepid co-chairs of the regatta. Dinner discussion, of course, centered around the wind shifts of the day. Sunday morning first offered a mere zephyr from the NE, "patience" becoming the word for the day. The Race Committee flew the postponement flag while waiting for the tiny breeze to grow. Boats were towed to the race area and after setting and resetting the marks several times the R.C. provided two races, bringing the total for the Nationals to 6. Well done Race Committee!

With boats secured we were soon on the BYC lawn enjoying a wonderful lunch of wraps, chips and homemade cookies. Joan and Susan began awarding the prizes for six races with 21 boats from 5 yacht clubs.

IT'S A LONG WAYS DOWN

The number one singing group in the mid-60's were The Highwaymen. When their ratings went down, folk singing yielding to Rock 'N' Roll, they wrote a final song, "It's a long ways down from number one." That's the way my sons and I felt after this summer's beautifully managed Nationals at

In 2003 our <u>Querida</u> not only won the championship but also five individual races. Our combined 600 pounds were perfect for two days of winds over 18 knots. This year the breath of Boreas was light and we finished 16th. But our descent was more than a mere matter of weight. I made too many mistakes.

Saturday's first race was in a dying northerly. On the second trip to the weather mark, Querida was in the middle of the fleet. As we approached on starboard tack two boats were on our flank and I felt smug about our inside berth. Suddenly I noted a port tacker that had just passed the mark but was in irons with less than the width of a Bullseye between his transom and the big inflatable. It was too late to shout to the boats on my right for room. Rather than hit the idle Bullseye I should have smashed into the mark, shoved it aside, and done my 360. Instead I opted to go inside and come back myself on port tack. Then I had trouble edging in among the next bunch of starboard tackers. I got around eventually but ended up hitting the mark myself and doing a 360, a real pain when you have spinnaker gear ready to go. By this time we were among the lonely few at the rear of the pack. The northerly faded and we failed to finish within the time limit. Score: 22. "Oh well, that's our throwout," we said, but our results in the next three races were mediocre—

Sunday was different. We got a great start in the first race. I had made a one-hole wishbone adjustment and the boat was her old lively self. Spirits soared. We led the fleet until approaching the second windward mark when <u>Cove Girl</u> sneaked by to leeward. "Hmph", I thought, "they can't possibly fetch the mark and I'll nail those Tiffanys when they tack to port." Not so. I was pinching so much they crossed successfully and in the final spinnaker run they eluded my every trick. Great sailors! Still, second place felt awfully good after our lacklustre Saturday.

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Not the end of story. To our chagrin, when we arrived at the club house we found no second place listed by our name for the day's first race, but instead the grim letters OCS. Yes, the Race Committee told us, they had shouted. We simply had not heard.

What lessons did I learn besides "pride cometh before a fall?" First, anticipate. We simply had not seen the hapless boat in irons soon enough. Second, on balance, no pun intended, two people will sail faster in a Bullseye than three. Third, be cautious at the start and listen intently to the Race Committee. If in doubt, go back. Fourth, and finally, would it make sense to have radios on all boats? That's a topic for a separate article.
