60th Annual Bullseye Nationals Regatta, Fishers Island Yacht Club, Fishers Island, NY By David H. Burnham



Dear Bullseye Membership,

The 59th Bullseye Nationals Regatta was held from August 19th – August 21st and hosted by Fishers Island Yacht Club on Fishers Island, NY. The weekend was full of energy with visiting crews from BYC, WHYC, and SBYC joining 12 local FIYC boats making for a busy starting line. The team of Meris Enright and Kathrin Leuchtenberg, sailing *Grouchy Ladybug*, won the 5-race series edging out Oliver and Jennifer Parsons by one point. Third place went to Brad and Tucker Gibbs, also representing FIYC. Full results can be found on the <u>Association website</u>.

Friday night's welcome reception gave competitors an opportunity to reconnect, swap stories, and speculate about the current within Fishers Island Sound. Daylight broke on Saturday morning with light winds and the postponement flag went up until late morning. Four races were completed on the first day of racing with the top of the standings yielding ties for first and third. Sunday morning started off foggy, but a steady breeze built throughout the morning giving sailors a beautiful racecourse consisting of five legs. *Grouchy Ladybug* crossed the line seconds before the Parsons in *Double Cross* to secure the championship.

Meris and Kathrin appear to be the first all-female boat to win the Nationals, as judged by the champions plaques on the back of the E. L. Goodwin Trophy. Other perpetual award winners include:

Ask Wendy

Dear Wendy:

I'm contacting you today about our Bullseye built in 1960. With a recent boom replacement, we can again roller reef. The problem is that our mainsail is held to the boom using clips. When the sail is rolled around the boom to reef, it chafes against the clips & creates small tears in the sail. We need a new mainsail anyway, so we are thinking about a bolt rope; Or, we could go with a loose foot approach? Do you have an opinion on which is best?

Dear Marty:

Thank you for the question about sail toggles vs bolt rope. Today, the standard Bullseye mainsail comes with bolt rope on both the foot and the luff. Bolt rope not only will give you better performance over sail toggles but can also be easier to hoist in older spars. There was a time in the 60's where guite a few Bullseyes had mainsails with sail slugs, so its common for some owners to assume this was the standard issue. They most likely were equipped with sail toggles as it was thought they were easier to raise the mainsail while single-handling. Sail slugs require a sail stop to be inserted in the sail feed of the mast and once in, you shouldn't have to feed the mainsail when hoisting. This modification however then prevents you from being able to use the standard cockpit cover. We have sold a few cockpit covers that allow for the additional sail material gathered above the sail feed/sail stop but there is an added cost for the custom cockpit cover.

On older masts, the sail slugs may not always go up easily. Sometimes slugs teeter in the sailfeed groove so you have to raise/lower, raise/lower. As you are about to make a sail purchase, plan on a suit of standard daysailing sails to be in service about 8 to 10 years. I commend you for recognizing the need to keep the roller reefing gooseneck in the boom functioning. The sails will need some care and maintenance too. I prefer the bolt rope, not only because our Bull's Eye races but also because I like using the cockpit cover to protect the mainsail & keep rainwater out. Here are some tips

about care when the sails with bolt-ropes are new. 1. Assure the outhaul is completely off before you raise the mainsail. A sure way to tear your new sail is to leave the outhaul tight. 2. Always have hands feeding the luff into the sail feed. 3. If single-handing, take your time and never pull on the halyard if the boltrope is kinked. As the sailcloth gets older, the sail is more forgiving but also can be more fragile as you have discovered. When sails are new, they are not as flexible & are also susceptible to damage if handled improperly.

You raise a good point about loose footed mainsails but the Bull's Eye Class Association would have to be approached to discuss. Currently, the class rules allow sail slugs or boltrope only.

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Meeting Minutes

Bullseye Class Association

Annual Meeting 4/24/22 Minutes

This meeting was conducted on Zoom at 4:00 P.M.

Present : Windsor Coffin, David H. Burnham, Dan Butler, Sherri Casey, Jean and John Childs, Kathryn and Chris Collings, , Peter Drinkwater, , Wendy Goodwin, Laura Hallowell, Ken Jennings, Niko Kotsatos, Conrad and Jo-Ann Lavigne, Kym Lee, George Lucas, Charlie Nichols, Chris Sears, Louise Packard, Kyle Stearns, Joan and Ed Tiffany, and Chris Verni; Gordon Goodwin joined the meeting about 4:30p.m.

President Drinkwater called the meeting to order at 4:05 P.M.

Both the minutes of the 2021 Annual Meeting and of the 3/9/22 Executive committee were approved. Secretary Hallowell reported that we have 64 individual memberships and 23 family memberships, for a total of 87 memberships and 110 members. This is about the same as the past couple of year.

Treasurer Burnham reported that we have \$15,144.29 on hand. Major disbursements in the 2021-2022 fiscal year included: Advertisement with Bonnier Corp. for digital advertising in Sailing World's One-Design Showcase. US Sailing Membership with placement in the US Sailing One-Design Central. A donation to the Marion Community Boating effort, spearheaded by Chris Collings. And finally, the regatta insurance underwritten by Chubb Insurance and the Gowrie Group. 2022 also included an additional disbursement of \$500 to Fishers Island Yacht Club in support of the 2022 National Regatta. Burnham suggested that we use some of our funds to better support local fleets. This was discussed later in the meeting.

President Drinkwater thanked SBYC for hosting the Nationals in 2021 on short notice, and expressed his support for the upcoming Nationals at Fishers Island.

Technical Committee co-chair Chris Collings stressed the importance of the BSA gift of \$1000 to the Community Sailing Program in Marion It allowed the program to upgrade and standardize their boats. Collings felts that sometimes simple ideas and modest funds granted from BSA can help to keep boats active in a club. It might be extra spinnaker poles to run a regatta, or even to assist in buying a club Bullseye. Further discussion showed that it might be a way to help smaller fleets bring in new members. The funds would be for club boats, not individuals' boats. Collings moved that the BSA grant authority to the Executive Committee to grant up to \$5000 in the 2022-23 year to fleets to improve club Bullseyes, for fleet education, and to improve fleet participation. The motion was seconded and passed 15/1/1.

Competition Committee Chair Kathryn Collings reminded the membership that their charge is to ensure consistency at the Nationals. Kathryn reminded sailors of the North U seminars and Dave Dellenbach's Speed and Smarts seminars.

Nominating Committee Chair Coffin presented the slate of officers:

President: Peter Drinkwater; Vice-President: Chris Verni; Treasurer: David H. Burnham;

Secretary: Laura Hallowell. The slate was approved unanimously.

He then presented the officers appointed by Executive Committee: Editor: Kyle Stearns; Technical Committee Co-chairs: Chris Collings and Niko Kotsatos; Historians: Jim and Kristen Pluntze; Nominating Committee chair: Windsor Coffin; Commodore: Windsor Coffin; Competition committee chair: Kathryn Collings; Nationals Chair: Louise Packard. These were also approved unanimously.

2022 Nationals and Nationals Rotation: Planning at FIYC is well under way. The NOR and registration materials have been posted. Registration is through Phlotilla. People who want loaner boats should request them by May 15; after that they will be released to the FIYC members. They are hoping to have 20 boats on the line.

We need a venue for the 2023 nationals since WHYC has withdrawn. The most promising suggestion was that we join the Classic Boat Regatta in Bristol. Drinkwater will contact the Herreshoff Museum.

The rotation is as follows:

2023 TBD

2024 WHYC

2025 BYC

2026 SBYC?

2027 FIYC? SBYC and FIYC may switch depending on what other regattas have already been scheduled at FIYC

There has been some concern that our website may have been compromised. Webmaster Richard Robbins has recommended the following:

1. Upgrade the site to HTTPS from HTTP. This would cost \$149.99/year. The hosting and domain name are paid to 2026. <u>Google and most browsers expects this from website</u> these days. The credit card on file with GoDaddy so we would need a credit card or maybe it can be paid from the PayPal account (if there is money in the account). The motions to make this change was approved unanimously.

It was also requested that David H. Burnham should be the contact person for apparel. The meeting was adjourned at 5:08 P.M.


